Considerable time was given to a discussion of such strategic supplies as tin, manganese, rubber, which is already subject to rationing. Legislation will probably soon be requested and enacted to make rationing legal. This, however, is but one phase of the broad comprehensive canvass of the complex ties of modern war.

Indeed, the scope and magnitude of the strategy staggers the small human imagination. The world is the battlefield. Our sword is unsheathed and in comradeship of arms with our English cousins, whom we now embrace as brothers, we shall wage battle wherever the tides of war may lead until victory is outs.
