Good Morning, Friends:

The outstanding news of the week in Washington was Secretary Hull's resignation as Secretary of State and the President's appointment of Mr. Stettinius as his successor.

Secretary Hull has been sick and away from his office for about two months, but his doctors advised him that the heavy responsibilities which he continued to carry were seriously handicapping his recovery. The doctors advised that only with complete rest could he regain his strength. Therefore, the great Secretary, feeling a keen disappointment at the tragedy that he must resign his work just as it reached its culmination, felt compelled to resign.

cerned, it has virtually completed its work for the year. During the week, Congress passed the road bill, the War Power Act, Smaller War Plants Act, and other pending legislation, virtually cleaning its slate of major legislation other than the Social Security Tax Freeze Bill which is scheduled to come up next Tuesday. The Senate was a little laggard, but when the Senate gets ready to finish legislation, it can certainly pass it in Capid fire order.

As this Congress, the 78th in the history of the United States, thus neared sine die adjournment, several members were taking leave tax either to have a look at the war or to take assignments in it. The House Military Affairs Committee is now in France. The House Naval Affairs Committee leaves the war of the Pacific theater of war. These men will come back with a knowledge and experience which will be invaluable to them in the coming problems of the country, not only of war and demobilization, but in problems, too, of collaboration and in dealing justice to those who are undergoing tremendous hardships.
