Good Morning, Friends:

A House and Senate Conference Committee which has been dead locked for more than a month finally reached an agreement on amendments to the G.I. Bill of Rights. This conference report will be acted upon by the House and Senate about next Wednesday or Thursday. It broadens the benefits which veterans may receive under the bill and seeks to make the loan provisions of the G.I. Bill more workable. Perhaps by next Sunday Congress will have taken final action on this bill and if so, I will undertake to give a fuller analysis of its provisions.

As usual, Congress is head over heels in work just before the time of adjournment. A month and a half ago Congress was doing practically nothing, but for the last two weeks both the House and Senate have had their noses to the grindstone with sessions beginning early and running late.

We still have another busy week ahead of us in order to clean the slate before going home for Christmas.

The House finally came to grips with employment legislation. You will recall that many weeks ago President Truman called upon Congress to enact a full employment bill. The Senate wrangled over it for a long time and finally passed a watered down employment bill and now the House has passed even a weaker bill. The bill suggested by President Truman would have declared it a national bolicy to provide every man and woman, able and willing to work, with the opportunity of having a job where he could earn a decent living. The President's proposal would also have set up

machinery by which a national inventory of employment would be made and plans for making necessary increases in public employment would be made and submitted to the President who in turn would submit it to Congress. But a majority of the Senate and also a majority of the House did not like this legislation.

They said it smacked too much of socialism; that the government was going to try to take care of the people, so they have finally passed a bill which amounts to practically nothing except that it does reaffirm a principle which actually needs no affirmation — that we believe in private enterprise and individual initiative. There is one saving feature of the bill as passed by the House — that is, that it sets up a commission to make continued study of employment and the prospects of employment. At least this will give to the President and to the Congress the benefit of a serious study the of/fundamental problem of jobs.

I had a letter this week from a veteran in Putnam County which I would like to read to you.

From this letter, which is typical of many others I am receiving and other Members of Congress are receiving from all over the country, you can see that the problem of jobs is staring the country in the face now — not five years from now. It certainly is an indictment of our civilization that it takes a war to give people jobs and sufficient income to have at least some of the better things of life.

It was said a long time ago that money is the root of all evil. Whether it is a lack of money or whether the love of money so blinds us to the actualities of life that we are unable to see that it is our master instead of our slave that causes us to be so stupid, I do not know; but to say the least of it, the fact remains that we have the richest country on earth where there ix plenty of things to work with and plenty of things that need to be done -- more roads need to be built, more homes, more schoolshouses, more churches, bridges, air fields, automobiles, regrigerators, clothes -there are a million things that need to be done, a million things that would improve the lot of humanity if they were done, and yet Congress will not even declare a national policy of full employment. Perhaps we ought to get down to bed rock and ask ourselves some questions. Let us discover our ills and then make our system work in peace with the same efficiency and drive that we have had during the war.
